

Ohio Developmental Disabilities Profile (ODDP)

The ODDP is a standardized instrument used to assess the relative needs and circumstances of an individual compared to others. It scores the responses for an individual to link the individual to a funding range, which enables similarly situated individuals to access comparable services under the waiver on a statewide basis. The ODDP is included in the Waiver Reimbursement Methodology rule (OAC 5123:2-9-06).

Key Points

- The ODDP is an assessment tool; it is **NOT** a comprehensive functional assessment.
- The ODDP collects a subset of information about a person's needs and circumstances.
- The ODDP must be completed for every individual enrolled on an individual options waiver.
- The submission of the ODDP assigns a score that corresponds to the person's needs and circumstances related to waiver services.
- The ODDP can only be completed by a person who has been trained and authorized by DODD.
- The service and support administrator (SSA) is responsible for the coordination of ALL assessments, including the ODDP
- The service and support administrator (SSA) must ensure the accuracy of the ODDP
- It is important that the tool be used accurately for each person and consistently for all individuals across the state
- The ODDP will be revised when significant changes in an individual's life circumstances occur, such as:
 - ❖ Change in living arrangement
 - ❖ New diagnosis or maintenance medication
 - ❖ Change in health status/severity
 - ❖ Change in level of independence
 - ❖ Change in natural supports or voluntary care-giving
